Domestic Violence Service Providers in Virginia

Virginia has 49 Domestic Violence Service Providers providing services to all counties and cities in Virginia.

Domestic Violence Defined

The Virginia Sexual and Domestic Violence Action Alliance defines domestic violence as a pattern of abusive behaviors used by one individual to control or exert power over another individual in the context of an intimate relationship.

Domestic Violence Service Providers

Domestic Violence Service Providers offer a wide array of services with the intention of responding effectively to the needs of victims of domestic violence and ultimately reducing the incidence of domestic violence in their communities. A Domestic Violence Service Provider must be a public or private non-profit agency.

Domestic Violence Service Providers:

- Provide 24-hour access to safety and crisis intervention for domestic violence victims and their children;
- Provide confidential services to victims of domestic violence and their children at no charge to the victim;
- Provide 24-hour access to support, information & referrals for women, men, and children who are victims of domestic violence, their family and friends, and other professionals seeking to assist them;
- Provide all services without discriminating on the basis of age, race, ethnicity, gender, religion, ability or disability, sexual orientation, gender identity, or income;
- Recognize and respond to the differing needs of diverse populations within the community and involve those diverse populations and survivors in the delivery of services;
- Promote protocols and practice throughout the community response to domestic violence to reduce the risk of continued violence and/or fatalities due to domestic violence and enhance safety;
- Promote a community response that encourages the reporting of domestic violence and holds perpetrators accountable for their use of violence;
- Provide community education that raises the level of awareness of the causes and effects of domestic violence in the community, the resources available, the importance of supporting victims and holding perpetrators accountable, and the importance of working together toward a Virginia free of domestic violence.
